## UHON 3510-002 / 351S2-001: Better understanding opinions of others and your own to reduce discord Fall 2023

Class description: Many perceive the current level of discord in politics and throughout our society to be unnecessarily high. A primary contributor to this disagreement is likely our ability to silo ourselves by communicating with only like-thinking individuals through both in person and virtual socializing. This partitioning often leads us to vilify people with differing opinions than our own. What most people don't recognize is that thoughts and opinions are simply a chemical response to an external stimulus creating a reflexive reaction and based almost exclusively on our past experiences and memories. People often fail to realize that at age 2, because most humans are physiologically very similar and have very few experiences or memories to call upon, people respond and behave in relatively predictable patterns. As we age and gain experience and memories, however, our responses and behaviors diverge based on those experiences and memories, thus we may behave very differently or have very different opinions or responses to stimuli (information) based on those experiences and memories. When others have differing opinions than our own, most of the time it is not because they are "bad" people, it's because their past experiences have led them to respond differently to the stimuli, i.e., form a different opinion or response than our own. To be better at accepting people with differing opinions than our own and form consensus among and within groups, we first must understand the basics of how opinions are formed, then understand how past experiences can lead to very different, but valid opinions. In this class, students will learn that an opinion is simply a response to an external stimulus for which we have very little control. Additionally, our response to that stimulus (our opinion) can change with additional experience and memories i.e., rational or emotional reasoning.

The first week of class will be dedicated to the first objective, understanding how opinions are formed. Through 2 readings and a short lecture, we will learn the basics of how humans perceive information and form thoughts and opinions. We will discuss the basics of the human evolutionary response to external stimuli and how that influences our current process of thinking and forming opinions. The remainder of the semester will address objectives 2 through 5 using the podcast *This American Life* (<a href="https://www.thisamericanlife.org/archive">https://www.thisamericanlife.org/archive</a>). Student are required to listen to 2 episodes of the podcast for each class then answer the following 3 questions in writing:

- 1) How were the stories similar to your own experiences?
- 2) How did the stories differ from your own experiences?
- 3) How might the experiences of the individuals in the stories reinforce or change your opinion on a current controversial topic.
- 4) Should we keep these episodes?

Answers to these questions will be discussed in class.

## Objective:

- 1) Learn the basics of how and why opinions form.
- 2) Increase the ability of the students to think critically.

- 3) Better understand how one's own memories and experiences lead to the formation of their own opinion.
- 4) Better understand how the memories and experiences of others lead to opinions different from their own.
- 5) Be subjected to other experiences and memories to see how those experiences could lead to an opinion other than their won.
